Martin Winter then conducted "The Golden Vanity" a pretty traditional English song followed by the Bedford Family Ensemble who rang "Knees Up Mother Brown".

Our last massed piece was "Meditation on O Valiant Heart" conducted by Sue Quarendon; a hymn which honours the fallen of the First World War.

After lunch in the sunshine with lots of catching up with old friends and buying of raffle tickets we ran through all the massed pieces again interspersed with some more fabulous solo pieces: West Peckham chose "Cascade for Chimes", All Saints, Maldon rang "Prelude on Te Deum" and Finsbury elected to ring "Fairest Lord Jesus". IN CONCERT

After three years of largely forced silence, the SE Region Orchestra came to life once more on Sunday 28th May.

The programme was as varied as usual and began with a rousing rendition of 'Celebration' by Fred Gramann. This was followed by 'Carol of the Bells' by Mykola Leontovych, a Ukranian composer. 'Light of Peace' came next, which absolutely sounded like its title.

The next item was 'Handel in the Strand' by Percy Grainger, an Australian composer. He was going to call the piece 'Clog Dance' until a friend suggested that with such a jolly rhythm, listeners should imagine Handel careering down the Strand!

'Lord, You Have come to the Lakeshore' by Spanish composer, Cesdreo Gabardin came next and then 'Toccata on Kings Weston by Ralph Vaughan Williams. Kings Weston is a manor house on the River Avon near Bristol.

The first half of the programme ended with 'Winter Wonderland' by Felix Barnard. The beginning was really atmospheric, being played on bell plates.

After a lovely ice cream, the second half began with 'The Triumph Song of Life' by Beethoven. It was arranged by Brian Childers, and the theme of Beethoven's 9th Symphony could be heard, what would Ludwig think of 5 beats in a bar!

Next we had the hymn tune 'Be Still My Soul'. It was heavily disguised in places, with discordant parts – the arranger, Alex Guebert, had certainly enjoyed himself! 'Down by the Riverside' followed, with audience participation of thumb clicks and clapping. Kate Hanks accompanied on her Double Bass - super!

Another hymn tune was next – 'Jesu, Lover of My Soul'. This was dedicated to Lillian Dawe - a member of Fordingbridge Handbell Ringers, who joined the Orchestra when she was 85 years old, and sadly died aged 96, last week.

'Reverberations', which has nothing to do with our HRGB Magazine, followed. It was Bach – but not quite Bach! And then a Spanish classical Guitar piece, 'Recuerdos' This translates as 'Memories of Alhambra'.

The last piece on the programme was a medley of four tunes from Les Miserables - which brought back memories of that great show!

There was, of course an encore – 'Obladi, Oblada' which encouraged more clapping and also flashing lights!

It was certainly a great way to spend a Sunday afternoon, and thanks go to Keith, Sandra and Martin for all their hard work in its production, and to all the members of SERBO, who played the very intricate pieces so brilliantly.

Lilian was an enthusiastic handbell player having started playing at Fordingbridge Handbell Ringers in 2003, then well into her 70s. She helped in the transition from numbers to notation and encouraged the group to go to rallies. Later, she was concurrently a member of Ringwood HR and when that folded of The Olive Branch HR.

As an organist at her local Baptist Church, Lilian had a sound understanding of music and graciously shared her knowledge with beginning ringers. Encouraging and supporting us in her quiet and determined way both individually and as a team, she

liked everyone to have a pencil and sometimes could be heard muttering 'damp'.

Never too old to rise to a personal challenge, (the harder and faster the music the better) she joined SERBO in 2013 aged 85. The first time she went she had never held a chime and after a quick tutorial with Sandra she was soon comfortable playing them. She also attended a ringing residential and UK Bronze.

Journeys to rallies and concerts were meticulously planned, using a proper paper map and Lilian was always the navigator. When the team hosted a rally, her Cheesy Puffs were much sought after. In later years a few selected people were allowed to make them on her behalf. The recipe was even printed in the SE Newsletter.

She still attended our Monday morning rehearsals faithfully and was with us even in her last week having asked if it was alright to come when she felt able.

She leaves a huge legacy and a gap in all our lives. We will miss her.
